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The mission of the Department of Town and Regional Planning:

Excellence in teaching and research undertaken in an interdisciplinary context which exemplifies the essence of 'spatial planning' and is characterised by critical engagement at the interface of social scientific theory and policy, more particularly with the objective of furthering understanding and action which is socially just in relation to spatial processes and place-based outcomes.

INTRODUCTION

This is the 30th Annual Report to the University's Liaison Committee on Town and Regional Planning (TRP). We hope that members of the Committee and other readers will find the Report a useful source of information about the Department and its research and teaching activities during 2009. The aim of the Report is not simply to give an account of the Department's activities during the past year but it also offers an opportunity to reflect on the challenges and opportunities confronting the sector more broadly and to explore appropriate responses and evolving strategies.

As this report is being prepared at the end of 2009, it is all too clear that a number of factors in the external environment are creating an uncertain view of the immediate future for the higher education sector as a whole. At this point in time the detailed outcomes from decisions to be made on the HEFCE funding of teaching and research, the review of student fees, and the teaching quality agenda, remain speculation only. The purpose of this annual review is not to add to the conjectures, but rather to report on known changes and to draw optimism from the 2009 activities reported in the research and teaching sections of this report.

A significant event in 2009 was the publication of a consultation document on the future funding of research. The last UK Research Assessment Exercise (RAE) was completed in 2008, and the successful results for the Department were presented in the last Annual Report. However, in December 2006 the Department for Education and Skills announced that a new framework for research assessment and funding would replace the RAE after the 2008 exercise. The underlying policy of allocating research funding selectively on the basis of quality was to remain unchanged in any new framework, but the intention was that the mechanisms should become simpler and less burdensome. Since 2007 there has been substantial development work on the proposed new arrangements, now known as the Research Excellence Framework (REF). This work has been led by HEFCE and in September 2009 it issued a consultation document that set out the proposals for the new REF, with a view that the future Panels would publish their outcomes in December 2013 following an assessment of outputs produced between 2008 and 2012.

The details of the REF and many practical questions remain, but the primary focus of the process will be to identify excellent research and the impact arising from this excellent research. The exercise is not intended to be a comprehensive assessment of all research activity within the sector. Some key features of the proposed assessment framework are that the REF will consist of three elements: quality of research outputs, the research environment and the new inclusion of impact; the assessment will be based on profiles showing the proportion of a unit's work that falls into specific categories, as used for the first time in the RAE2008; the dominant element will still be the quality of research outputs as judged by expert panels of academics and research users; outputs will be assessed against the criteria of rigour, originality and significance; and the esteem element from the RAE2008 will no longer be used. Other elements would in essence be carried over from RAE2008, although debate continues on the detailed configuration of the panels and units of assessment and how to achieve consistency between these. Much attention has been paid to the new economic and social impact element that arises largely from the Government's intention that research should be assessed for its demonstrable impacts on economy, society and public policymaking. The outcome of the consultation and introduction of the REF will have important bearing on the Department in the immediate future, but it continues to be the case that TRP places intellectual ambition before instrumental targets. We will seek to engage with the new REF process to develop our position as a world-leading academic department in the planning discipline and to reinforce our distinctive academic and collegial ethos.

Additional challenges in our research environment will also arise from the announcement by the ESRC in May 2009 to alter the way it will support postgraduate training in the social sciences

from 2011 onwards. The proposal for a new Postgraduate Training Framework will move the ESRC away from a system of providing training through recognised outlets and individual courses and will instead create a national network of institutional or consortia level Doctoral Training Centres (DTC) and Doctoral Training Units (DTU) providing the very best training provision. The primary purpose of the new framework is to further enhance provision for postgraduate training in the UK by building upon the considerable strengths that already exist across the social science research base. The lead on developing a Sheffield bid for a DTC is currently being taken by the Faculty of Social Sciences, which will allow further exploration of new interdisciplinary research opportunities supported by the ESRC.

The last two Annual Reports have reflected on organisational changes within the University, with the establishment of five new Faculties being the most significant. The Department has continued to adapt and develop new processes and procedures within the Faculty of Social Sciences during 2009, with significant investment being made by the Faculty in the Geography and Planning Building which sees the provision of new staff accommodation and the move of the Research School to be in the same building as the rest of TRP.

The following reports on teaching in the Department provide evidence that recruitment across TRP activities remains buoyant despite the economic conditions, although stronger in some areas than others. The RAE2008 result has certainly raised the profile of the Department at home and internationally, attracting both students and visiting scholars to Sheffield. The following years will see demanding challenges, but the Department is confident in being able to continue its pursuit of its goal of excellence in research and teaching in light of the likely wider resource constraints.

2. RESOURCES

2.1 Staffing

The Department's achievements remain a direct reflection of the quality and commitment of the staff. The retention, promotion and recruitment of colleagues continue to be pivotal. During 2009, the Department appointed three members of staff, secured one promotion and two colleagues moved on to new challenges.

During the course of the year, **Tanja Winkler** and **Matthew Gebhardt** joined the academic staff from the Universities of Witwatersrand, South Africa and University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, USA, respectively, providing an exciting international input to the Department. The significant achievements of existing staff were also marked during the course of the year by the well earned promotion of **Craig Watkins** to Professor, with effect from 1 January 2010. The Support Team also saw changes with the appointment of **Charlotte Mackenzie** as Departmental Support Officer and the implementation of changes that came out of the review of technical and administrative support highlighted in last year's report.

Also during the year we saw the departure of **Katie McClymont** who was appointed as a lecturer at the University of the West of England, and the retirement of **Margo Huxley** in September 2009 after giving many years of dedicated service and critical thinking to the planning community here and in Australia.

The accommodation issues the Department has experienced for some time have been largely addressed by a strategic investment of £500k by the Faculty of Social Sciences into the Winter Street Building. This investment has involved the move of the Support Team to a newly refurbished C Floor which is to become the 'hub' of the building for staff and students in both TRP and the Department of Geography; the creation of new academic staff offices; the move of the Department's Research School from their previous accommodation in the Dainton Building

into a new purpose-designed vibrant environment; and the creation of new workspaces for visiting scholars to the Department.

The planned growth in all aspects of the Department's activity along with the need to effectively respond to succession planning within an uncertain and difficult financial environment means that TRP will continue to need a clear strategic plan in order to sustain and enhance existing research and teaching capacity. The Department believes it is in a strong position as a leading planning school to face these challenges.

3. RESEARCH ACTIVITY IN 2009

3.1 Introduction

The last year has seen the Department revisit its research strategy in the light of the recent RAE results and in recognition of the way in which the Department has evolved (e.g. through its increasingly international and multi-disciplinary recruitment). During the last Research Assessment period, the most striking change made to the strategy was in the Department's research mission, which shifted from becoming "the leading academic department in the planning discipline in the UK" to becoming "a 'world Leader' in the planning discipline". The goal is now *to reinforce and to develop our position as a world-leading academic department in the planning discipline*.

It continues to be the case that TRP will place intellectual ambition before instrumental targets, bending the achievement of the latter to the support of the former. This approach has served to define and to reinforce our academic agenda and our collegial ethos in the past and such an approach is perceived as distinctive by our competitors and has underpinned our success in recent RAEs. It will continue.

Our specific objectives reflect the desire:

- to challenge and progress intellectual debates within the social sciences
- to ensure that inter-disciplinarity, internationalisation and collaboration remain at the heart of the strategy;
- and to enhance individual and collective standing, as evidenced by: publication in the foremost journals and monographs; award of research grants from respected funders; and further evolution of knowledge exchange activities.

The Department's research activities continue to be loosely organised around two clusters: Planning, Theory and Practice and Spatial Theories and Processes (see sections 3.2 and 3.3. for a summary of recent achievements). The cluster boundaries, of course, are permeable and there is considerable cross-fertilisation. A common thread which runs through the research of both clusters is a concern with questions of *justice*, whether social, environmental or spatial and there have been numerous cross-cutting initiatives including, for instance, the second annual joint research seminar with researchers and policy makers in the Department for Communities and Local Government held at CLG in May and a Public Roundtable debate on the Housing Crisis held in January.

The Department hosted numerous international research visitors this year including: **Professor John Forrester** (Department of City and Regional Planning, Cornell) who contributed to both the seminar series and PGR training; **Professor Marc Schlossberg** (Department of Planning, Public Policy, Management, Oregon) who arrived in September on a twelve month Fulbright Scholarship; and **Henk Wagenaar** (Public Policy, Amsterdam) who presented a seminar paper during a visit in the Spring. The visits of these individuals and numerous other colleagues from

academia and practice in the UK have helped contribute to further developing our individual and collective agendas.

3.2 Planning, Theory and Practice Research Cluster

The principal focus of the cluster is on developing analytical and normative understandings of planning activities through studies of theoretical concepts and policy and practices. Work in this area was very varied.

Philip Booth completed a proposal for a book to be entitled *Planning and the Common Law Tradition*, which has now been accepted for publication by Routledge in the RTPi Library Series. The target publication date is December 2011. He was invited to contribute to conferences on participatory democracy at the University of Florence, and on risk in urban planning at the Association Internationale du Droit de l'Urbanisme in Thessalonika. Both conferences will result in publications. In his role as chair of the Sheffield Conservation Advisory Group, he has also been engaged in an initial exploration of the possibility of research into the role of conservation area advisory committees in England in conjunction with his equivalent in the City of York, a former research associate of the Institute of Advanced Architectural Studies.

The calendar year 2009 saw **Heather Campbell** taking her post-headship sabbatical, which was delayed due to the commitments involved in being the Deputy Chair of the RAE Town and Country Planning Sub-Panel. The year proved very fruitful enabling the further development of Heather's research activities, most particularly the development of her theoretical and practical work on justice, planning and public policy. The last four months of the year were spent as a Visiting Scholar in the Department of Planning and Urban Design at Harvard University.

The year has seen the progression of several writing projects. These include an invited jointly authored book chapter (with Professor Susan Fainstein of Harvard University) for the *Oxford Handbook of Urban Politics* on "Justice, urban politics and policy", which was completed and will be published later this year. The aim being to bring together the perspectives of an author based in North America with one based in Europe. During the course of the year Heather has presented nine papers focused around the themes of spatial justice, public policy and the public interest, including guest lectures at the University of Amsterdam, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, the universities of Cornell and Harvard and a plenary paper at the 'Cities of Tomorrow' Conference held in Tel Aviv.

Heather's involvement with the journal *Planning Theory and Practice* evolved further, switching from the role she has had since 2000 as the Interface Editor to take over the role of Senior Editor from Professor Emeritus Patsy Healey at the start of the year. Heather is now responsible for the articles section of the journal. The first six months of the year also saw her continued involvement with matters concerned with research assessment as she was appointed the discipline's representative on the Higher Education Council's Expert Advisory Group for the 2013 Research Excellence Framework.

Steve Connelly has been focusing on using the results of previous field research in Sheffield, Egypt and Johannesburg to develop his theoretical ideas on democracy and participation. He presented some of this material at the 4th International Interpretative Policy Analysis Conference and at a seminar at Ain Shams University, Cairo, and published a related paper in *Policy & Society*. He continues to play a role in researching the governance of the development of the River Don corridor through the interdisciplinary URSULA project, and presented findings on this, also at the International Interpretative Policy Analysis Conference.

Paula Meth's work focuses on gender, place and violence, and experiences and management of crime in South Africa, which she has examined through three inter-related projects. She

considers questions of masculinity, as well as women's roles in 'insurgent planning practices', but also how residents and local institutions respond to violence and manage crime. She presented her work on 'crime management as part of local governance' at the annual Royal Geographical Society conference in Manchester in September, as well as at the Department of Geography, University of Sheffield and School of Architecture and Planning, University of Witwatersrand, South Africa in October. She also specialises in questions of methodology, specifically diary writing and has recently authored a chapter on the subject for a new Encyclopaedia. She has recently co-authored a substantial book for Routledge that re-thinks development geographies. Paula organised a key Knowledge Transfer workshop in South Africa in October, disseminating work to local residents and leadership; as well as co-organising a Knowledge Transfer workshop in Sheffield in March with **Dr Katie McClymont** on diversity and equality within Sheffield City Council.

Malcolm Tait has continued to develop his work on trust building in the planning process, presenting new work on professional identities and trust building at conferences in Newcastle, Liverpool and Washington DC. He has also continued to contribute to thinking on how planning applications are decided, presenting work on the planning process to CLG and being invited to contribute to the DBIS commissioned 'Penfold Review of Non-Planning Consents'. Malcolm has also developed his research links with Aalborg University, Denmark through coordinating a PhD workshop for students from across Europe on 'Doing governance Research: Understanding the Implications of Governance through Case Studies' held in Aalborg. He has also continued to develop work with Aidan White on the politics of reconstruction planning and its conservation through the publication of a paper in *Environment and Planning D: Society and Space*."

Glyn Williams has been working on issues of participatory governance and poverty alleviation in India, directing a major ESRC/DFID funded research project, 'Embedding poor people's voices in local governance: participation and political empowerment in India,' which will run until March 2010. Fieldwork was completed this year, and dissemination workshops were held with leading academics and policy makers in both the project's partner institutions (Centre for Studies in Social Science, Calcutta and Centre for Development Studies, Trivandrum) in December. The first research paper emerging from the project has been submitted to *Journal of Development Studies*, and the project's findings were also presented at the Royal Geographical Society's annual conference (August) and at the University of Salford (November).

With **Steve Connelly**, **Paula Meth** and **Tanja Winkler**, he has been involved in setting up a new cross-disciplinary group within the University, Sheffield International Development Network, and successfully gained funding to launch the network with a public debate in ESRC Social Science Week 2010. He was a discussant and chair at a two-day workshop on 'Experiencing the State: Marginalised People and the Politics of Development' (Cambridge University, March 12-13, 2009), and the book which he co-authored with **Paula Meth** and Katie Willis (RHUL), 'Geographies of Developing Areas: The Global South in a Changing World', was published by Routledge in February 2009. This was described by reviewers as 'a path breaking textbook' and 'a terrific achievement... [which] will become a standard reference for development geographers.'

Tanja Winkler's research activities include critically assessing 'the voice of the poor' in urban governance and public decision making processes. To this end, Tanja has been investigating the intersections and complexities between civil society, planning policies, and democratic governance. This research forms part of a collaborative project, known as CORUS, which is coordinated by Gecko at the University of Paris X and the Centre for Urban and Built Environment Studies (CUBES) at the University of Witwatersrand. While the focus of this research is based in South Africa, Tanja hopes to explore and expand lessons learned from South African case studies in other contexts of the 'Global South' and the 'Global North'. Tanja also continues to work on an ongoing project on 'civil society, poverty and inner city regeneration' which

has been supported by funding from the South African National Research Foundation, THUTHUKA (Women in Research).

3.3 Spatial Theories and Processes Research Cluster

The principal focus of the cluster is on the theories, processes and policies related to spatial development and their interrelationships. This has given rise to a wide range of projects and activities.

Peter Bibby, Paul Brindley, John Henneberry, Rania Abdel Galil and colleagues at the University of Westminster completed a research project for the Parliamentary Commissioner for the Environment, New Zealand, examining the scope for more intensive, sustainable development. Using an innovative approach to spatial analysis, the project identified for the first time the detailed settlement pattern (at the level of individual addresses) of New Zealand and the location of new development. It highlighted the need to give greater attention to managing peripheral and peri-urban development; rather than to high density, mixed use, city centre schemes that make a relatively limited contribution to overall stock change.

Tony Crook and Ed Ferrari completed their work (in collaboration with Prof Peter Kemp of the University of Oxford) on the structure and dynamics of the supply side of the private rented housing sector as part of the Scottish Government's review of the sector as a whole. Their work was published by the Government as part of its overall review report. Tony, Ed and Peter also spoke at a series of research and policy conferences on their findings.

Tony Crook and Ed Ferrari with **Craig Watkins and John Henneberry,** Steve Rowley at Curtin University, and a team at the University of Cambridge led by Prof Christine Whitehead were commissioned and have now completed the third in the series of CLG funded studies exploring the incidence, value and delivery of planning obligations. This work has been done at a time of much policy debate and the outputs of the three studies have fed directly into the work of CLG and other agencies. The results have been widely disseminated, including at many professional conferences and workshops. The volume of work undertaken on planning obligations by the Department over the last decade has provided a definitive evidence base (much lacking before) for the policy debates and discussions both within and outside government.

Gordon Dabinett has continued his work on EU spatial development policy and presented at 'The Regions and Cities Open Days University' organised in Brussels by the EU Committee of the Regions and EC DG Regional Policy. The session explicitly addressed the challenges posed by the recently published EC Green Paper on Territorial Cohesion. This theme was also addressed in a public lecture on 'Spatial justice and territorial development in the EU' given to the Department of Human Geography, Spatial Planning and the Political Sciences of the Environment, University Radboud Nijmegen, The Netherlands. The transfer of European experience was also the basis of a presentation given by Gordon to a session on 'Mega-region Strategy and Planning' held by the American Planning Association in Minneapolis, organised by the Regional Studies Association and the United States based Lincoln Institute.

Ed Ferrari continued his work in developing a housing monitoring framework for the West Yorkshire Housing Partnership and continued to collaborate with colleagues at Sheffield Hallam University on a four year study of Wakefield & District Housing's programme of housing and neighbourhood improvements. Ed has also presented papers reviewing the effectiveness of strategic housing market assessments at the Australian Housing Research Conference and to the Department of Communities and Local Government.

John Henneberry (variously with **Simone Allin,** Sarah Moore and Ning Zhao) has been working on the construction and distribution of value in the urban built environment and the various

economic, social, cultural, and political influences on this process. The bulk of this research is supported by two related research projects. In URSULA, he has been working with colleagues in the Departments of Computer Science and Landscape to link a real time 3D visualisation system that is used to represent a proposed development to a financial appraisal in a way that enables the financial structure (viability) of the scheme to be estimated instantaneously. The resultant model permits multiple alternative development strategies – incorporating a wide range of changes in site layouts, uses and building designs – to be explored quickly and in detail. It is currently being tested on case study sites in Sheffield. In VALUE, together with researchers in Belgium, Germany and the Netherlands, he has been developing a framework for valuing green infrastructure investments at project/site level and in relation to their impact on urban competitiveness. The site level valuations in Sheffield will involve the use of Stated Preference Techniques that incorporate visualizations of green investments produced by URSULA, allowing the exploration of the complex relationship between landscape quality, consumer preferences and property values.

Cath Jackson continued her work on exploring the preferences of investors for property attributes. This follows on from the RICS funded study with Dr Allison Orr (University of Glasgow). They, together with Professor Neil Crosby (University of Reading), have been exploring funding options for research into the pricing of property attributes by investors, as reflected in the capitalisation rate.

Alasdair Rae continued his work on spatial analysis, urban policy and its evaluation, and analytical methods for planning. He published an *Urban Studies* paper on the definition and construction of spatial context in relation to deprivation in England, in addition to a more technical contribution in *Computers, Environment and Urban Systems* – relating to the use of large spatial interaction datasets. This work has previously seen him invited to discuss his research with Communities and Local Government and more recently he has been invited to the Homes and Communities Agency's Strategic Outcomes Workshop in order to help guide the Agency's future strategy. In addition, he is now a member of the Regional Studies Association's Board as the *Early Career Representative*. Alasdair presented his work at international conferences in Liverpool, Madrid and Leuven and in September 2009 was awarded an Early Career prize by the Regional Studies Association for his *Urban Studies* paper (presented by President, Sir Peter Hall).

Craig Watkins has spent the last year working primarily on a series of projects that explore the structure and operation of local housing systems. This includes contributing to a major examination of the geography of housing market areas in England for the National Housing and Planning Advice Unit (with colleagues at Heriot-Watt, Manchester and Newcastle) and a recently completed study, with Michael White (Heriot-Watt), for Transform South Yorkshire that models the likely impact of a range of mortgage assistance options on first time buyer's housing demand.

Together with **Ed Ferrari** and **Danielle Leahy Laughlin**, Craig has also received funding from the RICS to explore the way in which survey-based data on household mobility expectations are used to forecast housing need and demand at the local level. The project is linked to a broader programme of work, funded for two years by the Technology and Science Board through a Knowledge Transfer Partnership with Fordham Research that seeks to develop the conceptual and technical basis for Strategic Housing Market Assessments.

Aidan While continued to extend his conceptual work on carbon governance, with the successful completion of his ESRC seminar series on Local Economic Development in an Era of Resource Constraint and Climate Change and a new publication on 'carbon control and eco-state restructuring' due out in early 2010. Aidan also delivered a number of conference papers on carbon management, including two invited seminar presentations. During 2009 Aidan undertook study visits to Bangalore, Stockholm and Malaysia (early 2010) as part of his Nuffield funded

project on planning for new economic spaces. The study visits involved interviews with government officials, business leaders, economic development agencies and NGOs.

3.4 The Research School

The Department is recognised as a leading international for PhD study in the discipline, reflecting the quality of research training and supervision we offer. 2009 has been a busy time for PhD completions with seven PhDs being awarded, two students currently undertaking revisions following their vivas, and more vivas to follow in early 2010. The majority of students successfully defended their vivas with only minor corrections.

Recruitment remained buoyant despite the difficult financial climate, with six new PhD students starting in September 2009: three from the UK, one from China (on a prestigious China Scholarship Council award), one from Canada (self-funded), and one from Saudi Arabia (government funded). We were once again successful in winning a University of Sheffield scholarship for one of the UK students and the other UK students were funded through the Department's Economic and Social Research Council 'quota' studentship and employer funding. The three UK students have all previously studied at the University of Sheffield, with two coming through the Department (one from the MPlan, one from the property Masters).

Research training continued to be strengthened with positive appraisals from students and external assessors. One of the distinctive elements of TRP's approach to research training is that it is delivered mainly in-house based around modules from the ESRC-accredited MA in Planning Research. However the reform of ESRC research training and the introduction of social science Doctoral Training Centres (DTCs) for the 2011-12 session will have major implications for research training. In essence, DTCs will be organised at University level (or through a consortia of Universities) with the core research training being delivered University-wide and a greater emphasis on training throughout the PhD programme. There are likely to be significant benefits for our students from the DTC, but we will need to work hard to ensure that the strengths of our existing approach are retained within the new structure.

The other key challenge for the Research School is to find ways of bringing the brightest and best to Sheffield. Our reputation means that each year there is a high demand for places from extremely good students around the world, but many of those require some form of financial support. The strong performance in the 2008 RAE has raised our profile and increased our chances of success in funding applications. There is however more work to be done to work with our partner organisations on funding programmes such as ESRC CASE awards, where an external organisation contributes £4000 a year to a fully funded PhD studentship related to their area of work. As always, we warmly invite Committee members to discuss ideas that could lead to doctoral research.

4. TEACHING ACTIVITIES 2009

Context

In the last five years, the Department of Town and Regional Planning has been engaged in a major revision of its existing undergraduate degree courses and a substantial expansion of the portfolio of taught postgraduate programmes offered. The Department has now entered a period of consolidation, and the challenge for the current session is to ensure that the Department is in a position to respond to the rapidly changing funding environment for the Higher Education sector as a whole. In practice, this will mean searching for greater efficiency in our teaching, whilst ensuring that our students continue to enjoy a high quality learning environment which reflects the Department's commitment to research-led learning.

4.1 The Undergraduate Programmes

At undergraduate level, the Department has now introduced revised Levels 1 and 2 and the remaining elements of new Level 3 are being rolled out in 2009-10. This review has involved a systematic review of the content and the structure of all our UG programmes (including the Dual Geography and Planning), and has been underpinned by a revised assessment strategy. The current session will see the final stage of this review, with changes to the Level 4 programme implemented in 2010-11.

The student experience and attainment: This year's NSS and SSS scores suggest that student satisfaction with the undergraduate programmes is high and has improved in most areas (Table 1): our overall student satisfaction score places us 4th within our subject area nationally, and first within the Russell Group institutions in our field.

Importantly, most areas of the student experience have shown a sustained increase over the last two years. These suggest that the review of the undergraduate programme is having a positive effect; the Department is also working closely with the undergraduate body in communicating how the programme is changing and why, and this has helped manage student expectations and encourage their active participation in programme development through individual course evaluation forms and via their year representatives.

Attainment of first class degrees within our UG programmes has historically been lower than the average for University of Sheffield as a whole. Figures for summer 2009 show a continuation of recent trends – and no significant break from the five-year average of around 5% (Table 2). This situation will be monitored closely in 2009-10 as this will be the first cohort of students graduating under the revised UG programme. It is hoped that the revisions to the programme will help our best-performing students achieve first class grades.

Change and innovation: The key change to the Undergraduate Programme in the current session will be the implementation of the new Integrated Specialist Study module in Level 3 – which has moved from 20 to 40 credits, and is supported by a restructured set of tutorials and classes. The Undergraduate Team has also undertaken a review of the Personal Development Plans, with

changes to these now being implemented in the current session. Two other elements of innovation are also common to both our UG and PG programmes:

Our already good lines of communication with the student body have been improved further in the current session, with staff responses to the Student Evaluation of Teaching for each module being circulated to the students at the end of each semester. The Department has further built upon its work with the University's English Language Teaching Centre for the support of international students, and now offers a well-tailored programme of support at every level of the curriculum.

Recruitment: This has remained robust, with the Department able to recruit over quota to its single honours programmes without compromising on A level entry grades. The Department appears to be fulfilling its goal of attracting a greater proportion of the range of quality planning applicants in the context of static market share for planning courses. In 2009, our applications rose by 19.4% overall, and our 'strike rate' (the percentage of applications translated into firm acceptances of places) remained around 33%, which is regarded by the University as an excellent performance. The one area of decline in student admissions this year has been to the BA Geography and Planning programme, but this was a side-effect of Geography's over-recruitment to its single honours programmes. Applications for Geography and Planning remain buoyant (up 16% on 2008), and this problem is not anticipated to be repeated in 2010.

4.2 The Postgraduate Programmes

The past session has seen the fifth year of operation of both the MA in Town and Regional Planning and the MA in Property (encompassing the MA in Commercial Property and MA in Planning and Development awards). It also sees the fourth year of operation of both the MA in Planning Research and Theory the revised Dual M Arch in Architecture and Town and Regional Planning. The MA in International Development and Planning is now in its third year of operation. 2008 also saw the first cohort of students enter for our new MA in Town and Regional Planning with Advanced Study in Practice. Further expansion of our range of Masters programmes is not currently planned; as in the undergraduate programmes, the Department is seeking consolidation of its existing teaching.

The Student Experience and Attainment: Year-End Student Evaluation Forms for our postgraduate students suggest that our postgraduate body is very supportive of the structure, aims and delivery of our programmes. This was confirmed by the External Examiner for our RTPI accredited programmes who commented this year that: "I can confirm that the standards in the Department of Town and Regional Planning are at the cutting edge in the wider higher education sector. There is a consistency and a duty of care evident in respect of students which is to be highly commended."

Student Evaluation of the Property MAs again showed students' appreciation of the quality of the teaching, the well structured programmes and the mix of teaching methods. Core elements of our teaching are therefore being received well, although some students have reservations about the fact that research methods and ethics are core elements of the programme. Whilst slight falls in satisfaction have occurred, this appears to reflect a cohort disillusioned due to job market conditions rather than our teaching itself. Both RICS External Examiners confirmed the quality of the Property degrees, praising the standards of our coursework questions, the standards of the students' answers, and the quality of marking and feedback. Both External Examiners commented that the degrees had either met or exceeded the expectations of the group of students they had met.

Attainment across the programmes remains good, with 18 of the 21 Property students, 20 of the 26 MA TRP and 7 of the 10 MA IDP students successfully graduating. Of the non-completing

students, there were 5 fails on TRP Dissertations, and the 7 other students were completing the programmes late due to personal issues.

Change and Innovation: This year, the recession proved an additional challenge for our students, which the PG teaching team responded to well. Overall employment rates remained high thanks to additional support provided for students on the Property and the Planning programmes where experts discussed with students tactics to support them in finding jobs in the current market. Presentations from other practitioners (Driver Jonas Consultancy, Homes and Communities Agency, Turley Associates) over the past year have also addressed getting jobs in a recession, and a dedicated session for PGT and Level 4 students was held by Marcus Zientek (Careers) who also discussed finding jobs in the current market. The Department encourages innovation from all teaching staff, one notable instance being in the *International Planning Project*, an IBL-based module which has been supported through CILASS funding. Here, students benefited from working directly with a visiting South African planning practitioner. Intensive work with him helped students gain an in-depth of understanding of urban design elements of this project, and this was reflected in high module attainment. The first cohort of the MA TRP with Advanced Study in Practice students have now completed their first year of study: tutorial meetings with them have helped to fine-tune the content of their practice year and make this reflect their learning needs and experience.

Recruitment: Although the number of applications has increased (from a total of 283 in 2008 to 312 in 2009), the overall number of admissions to the Department has remained stable. The MA Property degrees experienced a slight decrease in numbers from 2008-9, but have stayed remarkably stable given the wider economic climate, and the number of overseas students increased from 15% to 33% of the intake. The MA in Town and Regional Planning continues to expand: it remains central to our postgraduate provision, and continues to attract around 20% international students.

The new MA in International Development and Planning recruited three students in its third year of operation, falling back to the figure of its first year of operation. This decrease is being closely monitored and a plan for enhancing recruitment to the programme is being implemented by the Programme Director. The MA in Planning Research recruited one student, reflecting the specialist nature of the programme and its linkages to PhD study and recruitment. Recruitment to the Dual MArch remains at a low level: discussions with the School of Architecture regarding recruitment onto this Masters programme has already taken place. The MA European Development and Planning failed to recruit, and reluctantly the Department has decided not to offer the programme in 2010-11.

Further expansion of postgraduate recruitment is intended to come through the existing programmes. The MA in Town and Regional Planning with Advanced Study in Practice which is, at present, open only to applicants from South Korea could be expanded to other countries in the next few years. Secondly, further marketing and extension of the Department's links outside the UK, it is intended, will raise the profile of the Department's teaching. In particular, linking into wider international development networks both within the University (for example, Sheffield International Development Network (SIDNET)) and externally it is hoped will strengthen international student recruitment.

5. CONCLUDING COMMENTS

The past year has largely been a period of consolidation but there have also been many collective successes, and a further internationalization of all of our activities. The changing external environment has also generated new ideas as well as reinforcing our commitment to the mission and ideals of TRP. The desire to increase the effective transfer of knowledge and ideas between

the academic and practitioner communities and the call to engage in research-led teaching that is tied to practice, are both goals that have longed underpinned the approach of the Department. This approach has benefitted from the continued support of many partners in practice and in other institutions, and we look forward to continuing and developing these relationships in the future.
