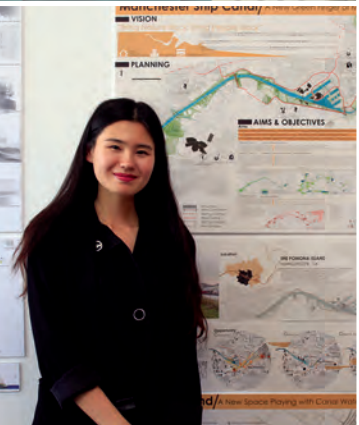

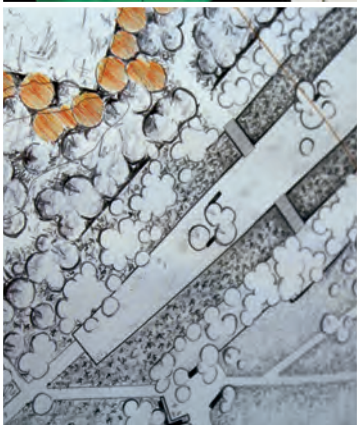
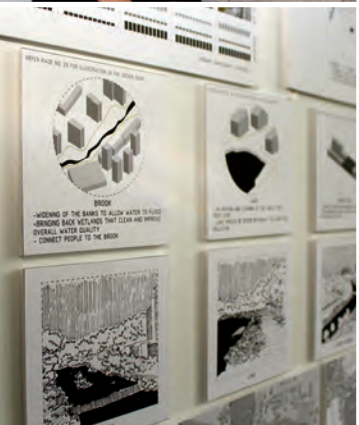

MA PG Diploma Landscape Architecture

MA Landscape Architecture is a two-year conversion course for graduates who want to qualify and work as professional Landscape Architects. Whether you have a background in design or not, it will help you develop the skills needed for modern Landscape Architectural practice.

The first year provides a thorough grounding in the design, social, technical and scientific aspects of the profession. You'll learn about the history and theory of landscapes, develop visual and IT skills and tackle a broad range of design projects.

The second year gives you the opportunity to specialise in landscape planning, design or management, or to take a cross-cutting approach combining more than one aspect.

Teaching and learning takes place both within the studio – individually, in groups and with support from tutors – as well as in workshops, lectures, seminars and out on site.

MA PG Diploma Landscape Studies

MA Landscape Studies is an intensive one-year course that provides a thorough grounding of the core skills needed by the Landscape profession.

You'll study alongside the first year of MA Landscape Architecture in an intellectually challenging and supportive environment.

You'll gain a broad range of knowledge: from history, research and theory, ecology and vegetation management, social studies to media tools and communication workshops.

MA Landscape Studies is ideal for international students who don't require professional accreditation or UK students who want to benefit from an in-depth knowledge of landscape and a wide range of transferable skills.

MA PG Diploma Landscape Management

MA Landscape Management is a one-year course that teaches students about effective management of both natural and designed landscapes. It embraces environmental, social, cultural and economic factors to optimise the management of many of our most iconic landscapes. You'll learn how to revitalise degraded, damaged or underused landscapes, while the Special Project and Dissertation allow you to explore topics of personal interest

The programme is designed to allow Landscape Architects to develop a specialism within Management, or to introduce Landscape Management to other professionals within the land-based, geographical or ecological sectors.

Students without previous employment within these sectors can opt for a non-accredited route, whereas those with previous relevant experience can undertake the accredited route. Students on the non-accredited route are provided with a general introduction to Landscape Architecture, whereas students on the accredited route take a more specialised module dedicated to UK professional practice, law and contracts.

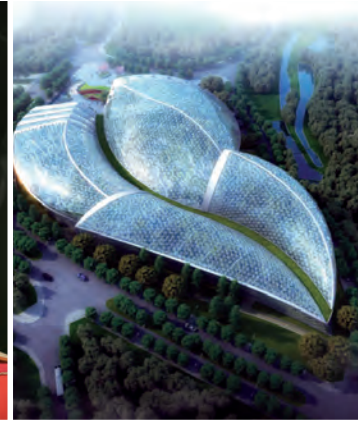

How to apply.

There are no deadlines for most courses but we recommend that you apply early – up to a year before you start – as courses which become over-subscribed may close to new applications.

WHAT TO INCLUDE WITH YOUR APPLICATION

- A CV
- Two references by academic staff at the institution where you studied previously or from former employers
- A certified copy of your degree certificate or any other qualification relied upon in support of your application
- A certified copy transcript of the marks awarded to you in connection with your degree (if applicable)
- A certified copy of your English Language qualification – currently we require IELTS 6.5 (with at least 6 in each component) or University equivalents.
- A short portfolio containing examples of your visual work for MA in Landscape Architecture and Landscape Studies.
- A 300 word personal statement demonstrating your interest in Landscape Architecture

Portfolio guidance.

In order to better understand your potential, we request portfolios from all applicants to MA Landscape Architecture and MA Landscape Studies, which can include work in any medium and from any field of endeavour.

The portfolio should demonstrate not simply creative and technical skills, but also your critical engagement with Landscape Architecture and urban and ecological issues.

We review a large number of portfolios, so a distinctive approach that demonstrates a passion for Landscape Architecture in a thoughtful and imaginative way will help you stand out.

WHAT SHOULD I SUBMIT?

Applicants with a degree and/or work experience in a design-related discipline:

- 3 projects that demonstrate critical engagement with topics related to the field of Landscape Architecture, e.g. schemes exploring urban ecological sustainability or social aspects of contemporary environments.
- Each project needs to be clearly introduced and include the name of the project, year of completion, aims and objectives and name of tutor if relevant.
- The portfolio should demonstrate your representational skills, including drawing and models, as well as your ability to engage with advanced studies in Landscape Architecture.

Other applicants:

- 6 samples of visual/creative/landscape work, which could include art/design work done at school, craft outputs and photographs of garden and/or planting design. You should include some landscape drawings or images (not photographs).
- We recommend that you draw a landscape that evokes a strong response in you. The emphasis should be on conveying the characteristics and qualities of this landscape as vividly and clearly as possible.
- You may use any media – pencil, charcoal, watercolour etc. We are not looking for technical competence at this stage but rather a commitment to expressing your ideas about landscape in a visual format. You may use a combination of words and images – restricted to 150 words.

Format

- A single pdf file
- No more than 12 pages in length and 25 MB in size
- Upload your portfolio directly to your online application
- Ensure that your name appears in both the file name and in the portfolio itself
