


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
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ROSPECT POINT





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JI JI returns to London this week to conduct two BBC concerts of his music

In the 1930s Igor Stravinsky visited London almost annually. No concert season at Queen's Hall would have seemed complete without a syllabus including his latest work, and involving him personally, either as pianist or conductor. At that time, he lived in Paris. Since he settled in the United States his London appearances have been extremely rare.

Stravinsky, who conducts four of his

works at the Royal Festival Hall on Wednesday (Home Service), and three of them again in the studio on Friday (Third Programme), is now seventy-six, but judging from his exertions when I saw him rehearsing *The Rite of Spring* in Venice this summer, the lithe and gnomelike genius has lost little of bis old spright



little of his old sprightliness on the rostrum. The Venice performance was a mellow one—the passage of time has reduced the aggressive element, either in the work itself or in its composer's direction—yet it was a memorable event, as this London visit will be, for, irrespective of what in the music of our time may or may not survive, Stravinsky's influence on it has been greater than that of any other living composer.

Spanning Fifty Years

His programme spans nearly half a century, going back from *Agon*, completed last year, to *The Firebird*, which dates from 1909. Both works are in the current repertory of our Royal Ballet, but that makes the sparse and sinewy score of *Agon* no less tough a musical nut to crack. Sections in twelve-tone technique provide a hard shell. Nevertheless, there is a deliciously rewarding kernel in a Galliarde, for flutes, mandoline, harp, piano, timpani, and the lower strings which shows Stravinsky's undiminished wizardry in manipulating musical sounds.

The Firebird first made that plain fifty years ago, and although its restless composer has preferred to move on and conquer new
